It was the evening of April 5, 2000 that a group gathered at the Library to discuss creating a historical society and museum. We did so and shortly the Lake Quinault Historical Society and Museum came to be and made its home on the lower floor of the Quinault Forest Service office building. It soon became apparent that this modern office space just didn't have that old-time ambiance that was fitting for a museum of our stature, so we started looking around for more appropriate housing. Obviously, we didn't need to look far. Directly across the street was the "Old Quinault Post Office", just sitting there collecting dust. Actually, at this point in time it was being used as a storage facility by the Quinault Lodge who bought the building several years prior. Wow, did that old building look good to us! Granted, it was a bit weary and there was obvious work and restoration to be done but we were up to the task! From February 2001 to May 2002 we were in negotiation with Aramark/Lake Quinault Lodge to acquire the building. It was May 1, 2002 that we obtained a lease agreement for the building with the provision that ownership eventually be bestowed to the Historical Society.

Restoration began, starting with the foundation and drainage and then moving on up to the structure. The exterior building and the inside "great" room were completed two years later and on Saturday, May 13, 2004 we opened our doors to the public. Work was in progress as we tackled one room at a time, proudly showing off our back display room during our summer season of 2007.

Tragedy strikes. The December 3, 2007 windstorm dealt us a terrible blow when a tree fell through the roof of our new display room. The room was demolished. We removed all the artifacts which remarkably fared well, and had to start over. Finally in June, 2009 we were back in business with two rooms open again. Now the kitchen is completed with new cabinets, sink and counters and the back "mud room" will be finished for this season's opening. We will soon be a three-display-room museum! Our next step is upstairs! "We're moving up!"

During all of this time we were anxious to say, "The building is ours!"

"THE DEED IS DONE"

ARAMARK/Lake Quinault Lodge, has officially transferred the deed to the Old Post Office building (Lake Quinault Museum) to the Lake Quinault Historical Society. Final papers were signed in April between ARAMARK and LQHS, with professional guidance from attorney, Jim Parker of Hoquiam.


